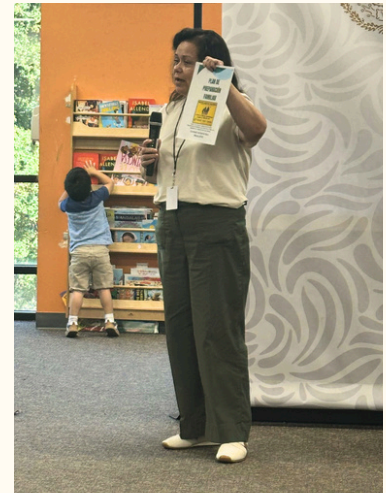


Immigration Resources & Information

On September 20, Governor Newsom signed Senate Bill (SB) 81 (Arreguín), Safe Spaces in Health Care, into law. The new state law provides critical limitations on immigration enforcement at health facilities (hospitals, clinics, etc). 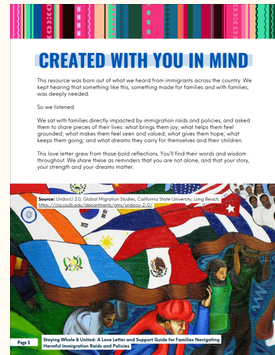
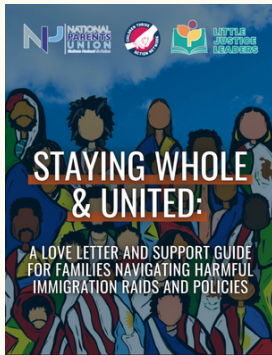
Apóyate South Bay Mutual Aid
